




Jacklines are an essential safety feature when sailing on a boat, especially in rough seas or adverse weather conditions. They are lines or straps that run the length of the deck, allowing sailors to clip their safety harnesses onto them for added security.

Firstly, it's crucial to ensure that the jacklines are made of sturdy, highquality materials, like strong webbing or stainless steel wire. They should be securely fastened to strong points on the bow and stern of the boat,

ensuring they can withstand heavy loads and extreme tension.

When clipping onto the jacklines, it is essential to wear a properly fitted safety harness that is also made from strong, durable materials. The harness should have a strong tether with a reliable lock-



ing mechanism. Always attach the tether to a sturdy point on the boat, using a secure and easy-to-release clip. This will allow you to move freely around the deck while still remaining connected to the boat at all times.

It's important to continuously adjust the length of the tether and position yourself so that you can move comfortably, but still remain safe. Avoid creating large amounts of slack in the tether as it can lead to falls on deck or overboard.

Regular inspections of the jacklines are key to ensuring their ongoing effectiveness. Check for any signs of wear or damage, and replace any worn-out portions promptly.

In conclusion, jacklines are an extremely effective tool of self preservation for all sailors. By investing in quality materials, securely fastening the jacklines, wearing proper safety harness, and regularly inspecting the system, sailors can significantly minimize the risks of accidents or falling overboard while sailing.

SAFETY LESSONS LEARNED FROM THE ...

y editors granted me permission to skip publishing my article in **October**, for which I was grateful, as my wife and I had planned a canal cruise in **Burgundy - Central France**. It was not our first time on a French canal, as we 'cruised' on the **Canal du Midi** four years ago. Still, it was a different experience. We slowly cruised for two weeks down **Canal du Nivernais**, navigating under many low and narrow bridges and through 53 locks, operated by human power! I enjoyed getting physically involved, assisting the French lockkeepers. The Burgundy landscape is beautiful. However, post-COVID pandemic, many of the advertised markets, restaurants, and wineries did not survive.

The French navigation rules on their **Inland Waterways** are different from our home rules, navigating our Inland Waterways. Canal du Nivernais runs parallel to, and sometimes joins, the **Yonne** river with WEIRS (*low-head barriers across the width of a river to manage the flow of the river*) that aren't very visible from a distance.

So, I did some research, as there was no 'Rules and Regulations' handbook that came with our boat. The sound signals are some-what the same, though rarely used. The signs to aid us in how to choose a safe path under a bridge, around a weir, or entering a lock, and what areas to avoid on the river, are unfamiliar. Of course they are crucially important. Here's a question: would you know where to find our Inland Aids to Navigation? Try <u>https://www.uscgboating.org/images/486.PDF</u>.

In **September** we looked at operating your vessel (INLAND) through a *Narrow Channel* while you must stay within the channel to navigate safely. So, I asked: *another vessel is crossing your course from starboard to port, and you are in doubt as to her intentions. What signal is appropriate?* One of my regular readers chose D, 'are required to back down.' Based on his logic that 1. *Backing down does not mandate leaving the channel,* 2. *The starboard boat has the right of way.* 3. *It would not force the port vessel out of the channel.* And 4. *The starboard vessel should sound* 1 *blast* (34.c.i. I am approaching from starboard) though I did not give us that option!

As much as I liked this answer, here was my response (*respectfully*): *Hmmm, good reasoning. My 'hint' was Narrow Channel so looking at the Table of Content of the USCG Navigation Rules that's Rule 9*. (a) is downbound, (b) is < 20 meters, (c) is fishing and (d) is <u>crossing</u>. Rule 9 (d) says that a vessel shall not cross if that impedes. For the 'in doubt' part: INLAND says in Rule 34 that you *shall* use the sound signal. Therefore, my answer is B, must sound the danger signal.

Now for **THIS** month's challenge. It is not too often that we see cones as day shapes on a vessel. But they are still part of our Rules and Regulations. What's important is the direction of the apex (*top or highest part, forming a point*). So I'll ask two questions. 1) what type of vessel or operation is indicated by a vessel showing two cones with the apexes together, and 2) what type of vessel is displaying one cone with the apex down?

CANAL BOATING IN FRANCE, A DIFFERENT ON-THE-WATER EXPERIENCE



Boating on a canal in France is different from our previous adventures, like ocean sailing, racing, river cruising and large international cruising. From a boater's perspective, used to challenges, it is quite relaxing.

Together with another experienced couple we rented a motorboat, nearly 50' long and 15' wide, with all the amenities you would find in a modern RV. The maximum speed allowed is 3.3 knots in a (mostly) straight canal with no room to pass. In two weeks on Canal du Nivernais, we 'cruised' 30-40 hours. But the excitement comes in going through 53 locks, mostly operated by human power, and navigating under some 70-80 low and narrow bridges.



The rental company advertises that no license or experience is required, even if you have never handled a boat. *"The base team shows you everything you need to know before you set off on your houseboat cruise, in just 15 minutes."* There is no document for waterway and canal regulations onboard. To us experienced boaters, this lack of knowledge and regulations shows.

Burgundy is a beautiful region of central France, south of Paris, with many castles, little villages, wineries, and a beautiful landscape that slides by at a low pace. Unfortunately, COVID made its impact

and many of the wineries and restaurants were closed. I hope that these will get a chance to come back, although with declining tourism on the canals this may not happen.

The Canal du Nivernais runs parallel to the Yonne river, and sometimes merges with the river. It was designed in 1784 to float logs to Paris as timber to keep factories and fireplaces going. There's no current in the canal, but the flow of the river varies in different places. There is no boating traffic on the Yonne river, but there are some challenges if you don't know the rules. I found a website: https://www.french-waterways.com/practicalities/cruising-regulations/ and the rules are similar for all of Europe. (*I have a European Operator's License for Pleasure Craft*.)



Above you will see us cruise the canal in full tranquility, pass narrowly under one of the many bridges (without scraping the fiberglass), approach a bridge with traffic signs, and choose where to "enter" under the bridge at the proper place. It is important to remember that the depth is only 5 feet or less, and our draft is 4'! The other challenge is the locks, often shared with others.

Looking back at this boating adventure, it was interesting, beautiful, and wholly recommended. It is not much of a boating challenge, beyond the logistics to travel there by plane, taxi in Paris, and by train through France. We also had to provision ourselves for two weeks, with the other couple, while the online travel guides were written prior to the COVID epidemic. All went well, no damage to the boat. We're still friends, didn't go thirsty or lose any weight, and I still

highly recommend it. For our next adventure we will look for something different, as always.





Boating Under the Influence: *Talk about it before it's too late.*

Let's talk about boating under the influence (BUI). Just because November is upon us and a lot of boats have been

winterized, we continue to need to educate each other about this dangerous practice. **America's Boating Channel™** BUI videos offer an excellent way in which to do this.

Check out the "Dispelling BUI Myths" video in Season Four that covers six major misconceptions about boating under the influence (BUI). It

teaches viewers about unique dangers associated with boating while intoxicated and features law enforcement actions and penalties for conviction of BUI. In Season Five there is a video entitled "BUI Fatalities" that covers the most fundamental reason for not boating under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Viewers will learn of additional associated risks and receive tips for avoiding BUI, such as using a designated sober operator.



It's not too early to start planning your boating show booth. Have you considered using a computer or TV to play a loop of the many America's Boating Channel videos?

It is an excellent way to draw people in to talk with you about safe boating through education, and the opportunities that your club offers.
